Unit purpose

On completion of the Unit the candidate should be able to:

- 1 Identify and interpret the Laws of the Game.
- 2 Demonstrate the practical skills required to implement the Laws of the Game.

Recommended prior knowledge and skills

While entry is at the discretion of the centre, candidates would normally be expected to have one of the following:

- ◆ A general interest in sport with knowledge of rules and procedures through previous participation
- ◆ *Sporting Activity: Association Football* (SCQF level 5 or SCQF level 6)
- ◆ Unit, Units or course in Physical Education (SCQF level 5 or SCQF level 6)

Credit points and level

1 Higher National Unit credit at SCQF level 7: (8 SCQF credit points at SCQF level 7*)

**SCQF credit points are used to allocate credit to qualifications in the Scottish Credit and Qualifications Framework (SCQF). Each qualification in the Framework is allocated a number of SCQF credit points at an SCQF level. There are 12 SCQF levels, ranging from Access 1 to Doctorates.*

General information (cont)

Core Skills

There are opportunities to develop the Core Skills of *Communication, Problem Solving, Working with Others* and *Numeracy* at SCQF level 6 in this Unit, although there is no automatic certification of Core Skills or Core Skills components.'

Context for delivery

If this Unit is delivered as part of a Group Award, it is recommended that it should be taught and assessed within the subject area of the Group Award to which it contributes.

Assessment

Outcome 1 will be assessed by a written assessment of the formal controls and procedures, safety requirements and the role of officials in a football match.

An oral assessment relating to formal controls and procedures will be carried out using the following format — a case study in the format of a DVD containing match incidents, requiring the decisions of a referee, played to each candidate on an individual basis.

Outcome 2 will be assessed using observational checklist to be used during practical sessions which demonstrate the skills and knowledge developed in Outcome 1.

Higher National Unit specification: statement of standards

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The sections of the Unit stating the Outcomes, Knowledge and/or Skills, and Evidence Requirements are mandatory.

Where evidence for Outcomes is assessed on a sample basis, the whole of the content listed in the Knowledge and/or Skills section must be taught and available for assessment. Candidates should not know in advance the items on which they will be assessed and different items should be sampled on each assessment occasion.

Outcome 1

Identify and interpret the Laws of the Game.

Knowledge and/or Skills

- ◆ Identify the 17 Laws of the Game required to referee a football match
- ◆ Decisions and actions by officials, relating to infringements and misconduct, are identified and interpreted
- ◆ The individual role of officials is described

Evidence Requirements

Outcome 1 will be assessed by the following:

The Laws of the Game and the safety requirements will be assessed by a recorded assessment under closed-book conditions. The assessment questions will be supplied by the Scottish FA and will follow their criteria.

To achieve success the candidate must attain 80%. Candidates who do not achieve 80% must be reassessed using an alternative question paper supplied by Scottish FA.

On successful completion of the recorded assessment candidates will be subject to an Oral Assessment. The Oral Assessment will relate to the formal controls and procedures. This will be assessed by a case study in the format of audio-visual playback of match incidents, requiring the decisions of a referee.

These will be played to each candidate on an individual basis. Candidates will view six clips with each clip shown a maximum of three times in real time. Candidates are required to correctly explain five out of six incidents. They must identify the following:

- 1 The infringement — if any.
- 2 Sanction — if any.
- 3 Restart of play — if any.

To be recognised by the Scottish FA the candidate must answer five out of six questions correctly in the oral assessment. This is required by the Scottish FA referee entrance regulations.

Higher National Unit specification: statement of standards (cont)

Unit title: Scottish FA: Laws of the Game

Oral evidence must be retained in a format which can be produced as evidence of candidate achievement.

Assessment Guidelines

The formal written assessment should take place under closed-book supervised conditions. The Scottish FA will provide the relevant assessment questions. Re-sit papers will be made available by the Scottish FA on request.

Safety requirements relating to a football match are described.

The oral assessment materials (audio-visual playback, questions and record sheets) will also be provided by the Scottish FA.

Outcome 2

Demonstrate the practical skills required to implement the Laws of the Game.

Knowledge and/or Skills

Candidates must display that they have knowledge of the Laws of the Game.

They must be able to demonstrate the capacity to:

- ◆ identify all field markings and checking field conditions
- ◆ check ball properties
- ◆ check players equipment
- ◆ demonstrate flagging techniques
- ◆ adopt appropriate positioning at start of play
- ◆ judge whether the ball is in or out of play
- ◆ adopt appropriate positions at the organisation of free kicks
- ◆ organise penalty kicks
- ◆ adopt appropriate positions at corner kicks, throw ins, goal kicks

Evidence Requirements

Outcome 2 will be assessed with a minimum of five hours of practical sessions. Candidates will be required to provide evidence to demonstrate Knowledge and/or Skills in the Laws of the Game.

Laws 1 The Field of Play, 2 The Ball, 3 The number of players, 4 The Players' Equipment, 6 The Assistant Referees, 7 The duration of the match, 8 The Start and Restart of Play, 9 The Ball In and Out of Play, 10 The method of scoring, 13 Free Kicks, 14 The Penalty Kick, 15 The Throw-in, 16 The Goal Kick, 17 The Corner Kick, must be assessed.

A record will be kept of the candidates' practical performances and responses together with the Assessors' judgement.

Assessment Guidelines

Candidates will be required to demonstrate knowledge and understanding of specific laws in the preparation and performance of the referee's duties. They will be required to apply key aspects of the Laws of the Game in practical situations.

Assessment of practical sessions, appropriate observational checklists and any recording materials must be kept.

Candidates will be required to demonstrate aspects of flagging or signalling, for example, and the accuracy of their responses should be noted (video records would also suffice). In other instances, candidates would be required to take up an appropriate position on an indoor or outdoor football pitch or appropriately marked surface to demonstrate knowledge and skills of, for example, the diagonal system.

Practical assessment of aspects of the ball, footwear and flagging techniques may be held in classrooms; however, it is recommended that practical assessments be held on a suitably marked football surface.

Higher National Unit specification: support notes

Unit title: Scottish FA: Laws of the Game

This part of the Unit specification is offered as guidance. The support notes are not mandatory.

While the exact time allocated to this Unit is at the discretion of the centre, the notional design length is 40 hours.

Guidance on the content and context for this Unit

Candidates will develop their knowledge and understanding in order to referee a football match. The Unit specification has been written in the context of 'formal controls and procedures' to accommodate the protocols defined in the 'Laws of the Game'.

The only allowable alteration to formal activity regulations is noted in the modification section in the 'Laws of the Game' booklet.

Approved SQA centres should be aware that the Scottish FA will support the provision of necessary teaching materials required to complete this Unit. The teaching materials include: Unit lesson plans, interactive presentations, homework, questions and answers, class tests, mock exams and practical lesson plans. (All materials are subject to updates in the Laws of the Game made by FIFA). The Scottish FA will provide Continuous Professional Development (CPD) training for all teachers facilitating the learning and teaching of this Unit.

The Scottish FA will allocate a referee instructor to guide individual approved centres during their first year of implementation of this course. Thereafter, the Scottish FA will provide individual classes with a Scottish FA referee instructor to support with the learning and teaching of laws 5 The referee, 11 Offside and 12 Fouls and misconduct as these laws require a standard interpretation.

On completion of this Unit the candidate must meet the requirements of the Scottish FA Referee Department and its subsidiary local associations to progress onto Unit 2 — Scottish FA: Practical Refereeing. This includes issues relating to Protection of Vulnerable Groups (Scotland) PVG.

Guidance on the delivery and assessment of this Unit

This is essentially a practical Unit. Candidates should be provided with the opportunity to develop their knowledge, understanding and ability through experiential learning situations, underpinned with supporting lecture inputs, as and when required.

Candidates are expected to develop their knowledge and understanding with supported practical application of the laws.

While the exact time allocated to this Unit is at the discretion of the approved centre, the notional design length is 40 hours. Candidates should receive approximately 15 hours theoretical and five hours practical tuition on the Laws of the Game. The remaining time should be utilised to develop the candidate's Practical and formal assessment. In order to achieve Outcome 2 it is recommended that candidates should begin training for the Practical test from the start of this Unit. Personal study time should be allocated within the remaining to complete revision and self study exercises.

Higher National Unit specification: support notes (cont)

Unit title: Scottish FA: Laws of the Game

Outcome 1 — Recorded Assessment

This Outcome is lesson based on candidates learning the 17 Laws of the Game. It is crucial that the practical lessons are facilitated by staff to underpin theoretical learning. A recorded assessment is provided by the Scottish FA. A Scottish FA assessor must be in attendance for the recorded assessment. The Scottish FA assessor will mark the recorded assessment.

Outcome 1 — Oral Assessment

This Outcome is an oral assessment. Candidates will be shown six video clips requiring an infringement to be identified, a sanction to be administered and an instruction as to restart play. Candidates are expected to answer five out of the six correctly to achieve the Outcome.

Outcome 2 — Practical Assessment

This Outcome will require the candidates to demonstrate knowledge and understanding in practical sessions. A suitable record (written or recorded) of such sessions must be retained for verification.

Facilitators of the course are strongly encouraged to attend a CPD event organised by the Scottish FA where they will be guided on the learning and teaching of the Outcomes.

Opportunities for developing Core Skills

There are opportunities to develop the Core Skills of *Communication*, *Problem Solving*, *Working with Others* and *Numeracy* at SCQF level 6 in this Unit, although there is no automatic certification of Core Skills or Core Skills components.'

Candidates will have the opportunity to develop the following Core Skills:

Oral Communication — through contact with players, managers, club officials and National Associations.

Written Communication — through written reports, in different formats, note-taking and record-keeping.

Problem Solving — Through the administration of the Laws of the Game.

Working with Others — Refereeing a football match.

Numeracy — Pitch inspection, report writing and time keeping.

Unit title: Scottish FA: Laws of the Game

You will develop knowledge and understanding in order to referee a football match. The Unit specification has been written in the context of 'formal controls and procedures' to accommodate the protocols defined in the 'Laws of the Game'.
