Examples of the Extraneous Rule

NB For the extraneous rule to apply, the candidate must have exceeded the total number of items for which points are awarded and the additional information given must be wrong. The maximum deduction per question/sub-question for extraneous material is 1 mark.

General Reading: Question 1 (a)

Example 1 Catherine was noticed by a producer. She got a part in “Annie”.

Example 2 She knew the director, and she got the part of Annie. She moved to London to be in “42nd street”.

Example 3 A theatre director saw her in a remarkable show, and proposed to her in “Annie”.

Example 4 The director thought she was spectacular. She played Annie then she was the principle actress in “42nd street”.

Example 5 Catherine was spotted in a show and offered the part of Annie.

Example 6 Catherine was seen in the theatre, then a director gave her the part of Annie, which she played for fifteen years.

<u>Example 1</u>	First statement correct; second statement insufficient/irrelevant.	= 1 point
<u>Example 2</u>	First statement wrong; second statement correct; third statement irrelevant.	= 1 point
<u>Example 3</u>	Two wrong statements.	= 0 point
<u>Example 4</u>	First statement wrong; second statement correct; third statement wrong. Extraneous rule applies. Deduct 1 point.	= 0 points
<u>Example 5</u>	Two correct statements. No extra information.	= 2 point
<u>Example 6</u>	Two correct statements, but a third statement which is wrong. Extraneous rule applies. Deduct 1 point.	= 1 point
<u>Notation</u>	When applying the extraneous rule, put a stroke through the long arm of a tick (✓) and write a capital letter E beside it.
