## **Roddy Stuart — biography**

Roddy Stuart started his professional life as a secondary teacher of Modern Studies, Economics and History in Cranhill, Glasgow, from 1971. In 1977 he was seconded to explore the educational potential of computer use and for the next 22 years he was staff tutor and adviser in educational ICT for Glasgow schools. Since 1999 he has been a freelance educational ICT consultant and has worked on a variety of projects in schools all over Scotland — except Moray. During nearly 30 years of involvement in educational ICT, he has seen several technological revolutions: from computers looking like wardrobes to computers in a hand-held phone.
