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1 Introduction

This document was previously known as the arrangements document. The purpose of this document is to:

- assist centres to implement, deliver, and manage the qualification
- provide a guide for new staff involved in offering the qualification
- inform course managers, teaching staff, assessors, learners, employers, and higher education institutions of the aims and purpose of the qualification
- provide details of the range of learners that the qualification is suitable for and the progression opportunities

The SQA Advanced Certificate/Diploma in Beauty Therapy provide learners with an industry recognised qualification and the knowledge and skills necessary to work within the beauty therapy industry.

The titles reflect the competencies its successful learners will have achieved. The qualifications contain units that provide underpinning knowledge and skills to work within the beauty therapy industry as either an employee or on a self-employed basis. Mandatory units ensure that learners have essential product knowledge and the salon skills required to effectively carry out the duties of a beauty therapist. The range of optional credits allow learners to extend their portfolio of basic competencies and develop skills in popular treatments and services.

The SQA Advanced Certificate in Beauty Therapy qualification is suitable for those who wish to pursue a career in beauty therapy. It is designed as a progression from National Qualification units in Beauty Care or Wellness Therapies, or adult returners with occupationally relevant skills and experience. Learners who successfully complete the qualification may progress to an SQA Advanced Diploma in Beauty Therapy. SQA Advanced Diploma in Beauty Therapy learners may progress to commercially specific training or a degree programme, for example BA (Hons) Beauty Therapy Management.

The SQA Advanced Certificate/Diploma in Beauty Therapy qualifications are suitable to be delivered as a full- or part-time course.

The beauty industry continues to grow and is evidenced by the profusion of opportunities advertised through online recruitment sites where new jobs are added weekly. SkillsActive/HABIA is the Sector Skills Council (the Government approved standards setting Council for Beauty, Hair, Nails and Spa sector), indicate the trend for growth is due to the influence of fashion, the desire to look younger and the increase in real disposable income. Statistics gathered by them for 2011–12, indicate that annual turnover in the industry was £6.2 billion. Approximately 58% were employed and 42% worked on a self-employed basis, working from home, as a mobile therapist or renting rooms in hair-dressing salons. In May 2017, Indeed.co.uk quoted the average Scottish salary for those working in the industry as £21,348 (estimated over a 12-month period to May 2017 from 13,303 employers, users and past and present job advertisements on the site).

Most job advertisements require prospective employees to have the equivalent of an SQA Advanced Certificate qualification as minimum. Employers request an SQA Advanced Diploma level qualification where the employee will be required to carry out a wider range of treatments, therapies and services, where the employer requires an individual with a higher degree of product knowledge and professional skills, and/or where the employee will have some supervisory capacity. It is clear from employer feedback that they require potential employees

to be well qualified in soft-skills, empathic communication. These skills are reflected in the SQA Advanced Certificate/Diploma.

The qualifications have been developed following consultation with a large number of beauty salons and spas, as well as extensive input from delivering centres, who have been able to provide contextualised local trends through the close working relationships they have established with key employers. HABIA reports that although there is some innovation in the industry, most beauty treatments remain essentially the same. The consultation process has led to a robust set of mandatory units which provide learners with a high level of salon skills and product knowledge. Further responses to the consultations have resulted in the development of units for body massage treatments, signature therapies (different types of massage treatments such as stone, shell, bamboo etc), nail enhancements and eyelash and eyebrow enhancements, all of which have grown in popularity recently.

2 Qualifications structure

For the SQA Advanced Certificate in Beauty Therapy qualification learners must achieve 12 SQA credits. It comprises 96 SCQF credit points of which 48 SCQF credit points are at SCQF level 7 in the mandatory section including a graded unit of 8 SCQF credit points at SCQF level 7. There is a minimum of 48 SCQF credit points available in the optional section of the SQA Advanced Certificate in Beauty Therapy.

Learners must achieve all of the following mandatory units (6 SQA credits/48 SCQF credits).

SQA Advanced Diploma in Beauty Therapy structure

To achieve the full SQA Advanced Diploma in Beauty Therapy learners must achieve 30 SQA credits/240 SCQF credits. It comprises 240 SCQF credit points of which 56 are at SCQF level 8 in the mandatory section including a graded unit of 16 SCQF credit points at SCQF level 8. There is also a restricted mandatory group of SCQF level 8 units to allow centres and learners more flexibility. A minimum of 2 SQA credits/16 SQA credits must be taken from this group.

3 Aims of the qualifications

The overall aim of the SQA Advanced Certificate/ Diploma in Beauty Therapy qualification is to provide a progressive and coherent qualification which will be responsive to the needs of learners, employers and those wishing to progress to higher education (HE). It will enable successful learners to make significant contributions to the efficient and effective running of a busy salon.

3.1 General aims of the qualifications

All SQA Advanced Certificate/Diploma qualifications have a range of broad aims that are generally applicable to all equivalent HE qualifications:

- 1 Develop critical and evaluative thinking.
- 2 Develop problem solving.
- 3 Develop the ability to manage and absorb information.
- 4 Develop communication skills and presentation techniques.
- 5 Develop the ability to be flexible and to work co-operatively with others.
- 6 Develop personal effectiveness and self-reflection skills.
- 7 Develop the ability to take responsibility for one's own learning.
- 8 Develop study and research skills.
- 9 Develop skills in IT.
- 10 Develop current employment skills and expertise.
- 11 Provide opportunities for career planning.
- 12 Enhance employment prospects for learners undertaking the course/s.
- 13 Enable progression within the SCQF including progression to HE.

3.2 Specific aims of the qualifications

The specific aims of the SQA Advanced Certificate in Beauty Therapy are to:

- 14 develop a sound understanding of the principles of anatomy and physiology in relation to the application of beauty therapy techniques.
- 15 develop knowledge, understanding and practical skills in a variety of standard beauty therapy treatments.

The specific aims of the SQA Advanced Diploma in Beauty Therapy are to:

- 16 enhance empathic client care skills.
- 17 enhance and extend knowledge, understanding and practical skills in a wide variety of beauty therapy treatments.
- 18 enhance confidence in using salon equipment.
- 19 enhance working practices to the current accepted professional standards within the industry.

3.3 Graded units

Graded Unit 1

The purpose of the graded unit is to assess the learners' ability to retain and integrate the knowledge and/or skills gained in the mandatory units, to assess that the learner has met the specific aims of the group qualification and to grade learner achievement.

The graded unit will be assessed by practical activity. The graded unit will be assessed and a grade of A, B or C awarded.

Beauty Therapy Graded Unit 1 is a practical assignment. Learners must plan all aspects of a salon day to demonstrate how they would manage a successful column. They must plan to deliver a range of treatments, implement their plan by running the salon day undertaking a minimum of six treatments on different clients, demonstrating a range of practical skills. The range of treatments must be varied and include single, combination and short treatments. Multiple treatments must be carried out on a minimum of two clients. The investigation will culminate in the learner evaluating the success of the planned day.

The work necessary to undertake the practical assignment will consolidate skills and knowledge acquired throughout the SQA Advanced Certificate in Beauty Therapy and must reflect the content of the mandatory units of the award.

Graded Unit 2

Beauty Therapy Graded Unit 2 will be an investigation and practical activity. The learner will identify a client with a specific face and/or body condition and consult with the client to plan a course of treatment that will promote the client's specific conditions. Treatments may include: anti-ageing, active acne, acne scars, pigmentation marks, acne rosacea, cellulite, dull lifeless skin (this list is not exhaustive).

Learners will utilise the skills learned to analyse the condition, plan a treatment package for treating the client. Discuss the benefits and effects of the treatment, identifying contraindications which may prevent treatments. Performance will be on two individual clients, recording and monitoring any changes to the client's condition over the treatments.

The learner will then evaluate the treatment plan, performance and present their findings to a selected audience.

4 Recommended entry to the qualifications

Entry to this qualification is at the discretion of the centre. The following information on prior knowledge, skills, experience, or qualifications that provide suitable preparation for this qualification has been provided by the Qualification Design Team as guidance only.

Learners would benefit from having attained the skills, knowledge, and understanding required by one or more of the following or equivalent qualifications and/or experience:

It is recommended that learners have some background knowledge and experience within the broad area of 'Beauty Therapy', this may comprise but is not restricted to:

- NQ units at SCQF level 6
- NVQ at level 3 in appropriate subjects
- Adult returners with occupationally relevant skills and experience
- A minimum of two Highers

Entry to the SQA Advanced Diploma in Beauty Therapy is at the discretion of the centre. It is recommended that learners have completed the SQA Advanced Certificate in Beauty Therapy or equivalent.

4.1 Core Skills entry profile

The Core Skill entry profile provides a summary of the associated assessment activities that exemplify why a particular level has been recommended for this qualification. The information would be used to identify whether additional learning support needs should be put in place for learners whose Core Skills profile is below the recommended entry level, or whether learners should be encouraged to do an alternative level or learning programme.

5 Additional benefits of the qualification in meeting employer needs

In addition, significant opportunities exist for learners to develop more generic skills, known as Core Skills, through this qualification.

6 Guidance on approaches to delivery and assessment

6.1 Sequencing/integration of units

While sequence of delivery of the units is for individual centres to decide, centres may wish to consider the assessment balance in each block/semester. In addition, centres are encouraged to integrate assessment where practicable to avoid unnecessary repetition and over assessment.

It is strongly recommended that direct entry learners to the SQA Advanced Certificate in Beauty Therapy qualification achieve the following units prior to the delivery and assessing of the mandatory unit: Beauty Therapy: Face and Body Treatment Packages.

Learners must have achieved or be working towards the mandatory units prior to undertaking the SQA Advanced Diploma in Beauty Therapy Graded Unit 1.

The units in the SQA Advanced Diploma in Beauty Therapy can be delivered in any sequence however, learners must have achieved or be working towards the mandatory units prior to undertaking the SQA Advanced Diploma in Beauty Therapy Graded Unit 2.

The opportunity exists within this unit (J7TN 47) to cross reference the contra-indications and special care conditions applicable to outcome 1 where these have successfully been achieved in the closed-book written assessment in J7V7 47 Body Massage Treatments.

J7VL 47 Signature Massage

The opportunity exists within this unit (J7VL 47) to cross reference contra-indications and special care conditions applicable to outcome 1 where these have been successfully achieved in the closed-book written assessment from either of the following units:

- J7V7 47 Body Massage Treatments (all)
- J7TN 47 Aromatherapy Massage (with the exception of special care conditions varicose veins, metal pins/plates)

Contra-indications and special care conditions cannot however be cross referenced from the open-book assessment in this unit (J7VL 47) to a closed-book assessment.

6.2 Recognition of prior learning

SQA recognises that learners gain knowledge and skills acquired through formal, non-formal, and informal learning contexts.

In some instances, a full group award may be achieved through the recognition of prior learning. However, it is unlikely that a learner would have the appropriate prior learning and experience to meet all the requirements of a full group award.

8 Glossary of terms

Embedded Core Skills: The assessment evidence for the unit also includes full evidence for complete Core Skill or Core Skill components. A learner successfully completing the unit will be automatically certificated for the Core Skill. (This depends on the unit having been successfully audited and validated for Core Skills certification.)

Finish date: The end of a group award's lapsing period is known as the finish date. After the finish date, the group award will no longer be live and the following applies:

- ◆ Candidates may not be entered for the group award.
- ◆ The group award will continue to exist only as an archive record on the Awards Processing System (APS).

Graded unit: Graded units assess learners' ability to integrate what they have learned while working towards the units of the group award. Their purpose is to add value to the group award, making it more than the sum of its parts, and to encourage learners to retain and adapt their skills and knowledge.

Lapsing date: When a group award is entered into its lapsing period, the following will apply:

- The group award will be deleted from the relevant catalogue.
- ♦ The group award specification will remain until the qualification reaches its finish date, at which point it will be removed from SQA's website and archived.
- No new centres may be approved to offer the group award.
- Centres should only enter candidates whom they expect to complete the group award during the defined lapsing period.

SQA credit value: The credit value allocated to a unit gives an indication of the contribution the unit makes to an SQA group award. An SQA credit value of 1 given to an SQA unit represents approximately 40 hours of programmed learning, teaching, and assessment.

SCQF: The Scottish Credit and Qualification Framework (SCQF) provides the national common framework for describing all relevant programmes of learning and qualifications in Scotland. SCQF terminology is used throughout this guide to refer to credits and levels. For further information on the SCQF, visit the SCQF website at www.scqf.org.uk.

SCQF credit points: SCQF credit points provide a means of describing and comparing the amount of learning that is required to complete a qualification at a given level of the framework. One National Unit credit is equivalent to 6 SCQF credit points. One National Unit credit at Advanced Higher and one SQA Advanced unit credit (irrespective of level) is equivalent to 8 SCQF credit points.

SCQF levels: The level a qualification assigned within the framework is an indication of how hard it is to achieve. The SCQF covers 12 levels of learning. SQA Advanced Certificates and SQA Advanced Diplomas are available at SCQF levels 7 and 8, respectively. SQA Advanced units will normally be at levels 6–9 and graded units will be at level 7 and 8. National Qualification Group Awards are available at SCQF levels 2–6 and will normally be made up of National Units which are available from SCQF levels 2–7.

Signposted Core Skills: These refer to opportunities to develop Core Skills in learning and teaching, but are not automatically certificated.

10 General information for learners

This section will help you to decide whether this is the qualification for you by explaining: what the qualification is about; what you should know or what you should be able to do before you start; what you will need to do during the qualification; and opportunities for further learning and employment.

This qualification offers you the opportunity to gain the practical experience to allow you to prepare for working as a beauty therapist in a professional beauty/spa environment or to progress further in your studies.

Good communication skills and professional etiquette are essential to work within the beauty therapy/spa industry.

You will learn to carry out in-depth consultations with clients to ascertain the aims of the therapy to be applied, provide a rationale for your chosen therapy, prepare the treatment area and effectively perform the treatments. An empathic approach to clients and colleagues should be demonstrated and client confidentiality adhered to.

As part of your course you will undertake a variety of assessment methods to develop your knowledge and skills, eg research, investigations, closed-book written assessment, practical performance.

Aspects of the Core Skill of *Problem Solving*, that is, Planning and Organising, Critical Thinking, and Reviewing and Evaluating, will be naturally developed as the contemporary aesthetic treatment is planned and safely undertaken. In planning the treatment, you will identify and analyse a range of factors including suitable products, equipment and techniques to ensure the treatment meets the needs of each individual client. The treatment experience must ensure client comfort and safety. Taking account of timing sequence and duration will require good planning and organisational skills. Compliance with health and safety legislation is integral to achievement. Analytical evaluation of the effectiveness of treatments in relation to identified aims could be enhanced by formative group discussion.

Communication skills are not formally assessed, but you will be expected to present Oral and Written communication to an acceptable professional standard. Skills in accessing and analysing information on CAT effects and techniques should be developed to provide underpinning knowledge on professional issues and resources. Evaluation of information accessed should be encouraged in order to assure that information is accurate and current.

Oral communication skills will be developed in practical work with clients where interaction must be professional, sensitive and empathic. Communicating appropriate information to clients, explaining and reassuring during treatment sessions and giving aftercare advice and specific relevant lifestyle advice will be an essential aspect of competence. You should be fully aware of a range of active listening techniques in order to relate and respond to others in the most appropriate and effective way, adapting language, and approach to suit their purpose and clientele.
