Source 1 is a sketch map of an estuary on the east coast of the United Kingdom.


Source 2 is information about maritime container terminals.

Source 4 is a diagram of a bird species found on the mudflat.








Source 1 Sketch map showing an estuary on the east coast of the United Kingdom

#### Source 2 Information about maritime container terminals

A maritime container terminal is a harbour where cargo containers are loaded on or off ocean-going container ships. Trains and lorries are used to transport containers to and from the terminal. These terminals usually provide storage facilities for both loaded and empty containers. Loaded containers are stored for relatively short periods.




Source 3 Statement from the company proposing the development

'The construction of this container terminal will generate hundreds of jobs in this area by 2030 and will boost the local economy by £25 million annually. Road and rail links will have to be improved in the local area to allow efficient transportation of containers. This will encourage more new industries to move into this area, which create even more jobs in the future'.
