

### **Higher National Graded Unit specification**

**Credit points and level:** 1 HN credit at SCQF level 8: (8 SCQF credit points at SCQF level 8\*)

\*SCQF credit points are used to allocate credit to qualifications in the Scottish Credit and Qualifications Framework (SCQF). Each qualification in the Framework is allocated a number of SCQF credit points at an SCQF level. There are 12 SCQF levels, ranging from National 1 to Doctorates.

**Purpose:** This Graded Unit is designed to provide evidence that the candidate has achieved the following principal aims of the HND Agriculture:

- to provide vocational skills and knowledge required for employment at supervisory/junior managerial level within the agricultural industry and for self-employment in farming or other land-based sectors
- to ensure that candidates gain the skills, knowledge and understanding of animal and crop production technology, farm mechanisation, business management and managing people which are necessary for a position as a trainee/assistant farm manager or equivalent
- to ensure that candidates have a sound appreciation of animal welfare, environmental and conservation issues and understand the concept of sustainability
- to facilitate progression to degree level education based on a sound foundation in applied science and technology, business management, Core Skills, and an understanding of the multifunctional nature of agriculture

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**Graded Unit title**: Agriculture Graded Unit 3

#### Conditions of assessment

The assessment is based on a closed-book assessment examination lasting 3 hours.

The questions will be unseen by the candidate until the time of the examination. The examination paper will be divided in three sessions, with a break allowed between the sessions. Where this is the case, candidates will only be permitted to see the sections which are being examined in that session. To achieve this Unit, candidates should attain 50% of the available marks with achievement being graded according to marks attained.

Reasonable assistance is the term used by SQA to describe the difference between providing candidates with some direction to generate the required evidence for assessment and providing too much support which would compromise the integrity of the assessment. Reasonable assistance is part of all learning and teaching processes.

In relation to the assessment of Higher National Examination-based Graded Units, assessors may provide advice and guidance on examination technique and clarification on the meaning of command words which may appear within an examination paper, prior to the formal examination.

Remediation is not allowed in Examination-based Graded Unit assessments.

Any candidate who has failed their Higher National Examination-based Graded Unit or wishes to upgrade their award must be given a re-assessment opportunity, or in exceptional circumstances, two re-assessment opportunities. This must be done by using a substantially different examination.

The final grading given must reflect the quality of the candidate's evidence at the time of the completion of the graded unit. Candidates must be awarded the highest grade achieved, whether through first sitting or through any re-assessment.

The examination should be unseen and the assessment should be conducted in controlled and invigilated conditions.

At all times, the security, integrity and confidentiality of examinations must be ensured.

## Instructions for designing the assessment task:

The examination should be designed to assess the candidate's critical knowledge and understanding of the topics relating to the specific aims which this Graded Unit is designed to cover. The questions and corresponding marks should be designed in accordance with the ranges indicated in the table that follows. However, the overall total mark for the examination is 100.

The questions in the examination should be based on subject material drawn from the Units from the HND Agriculture which comprise the Recommended Prior Knowledge and Skills.

The format of the examination should be designed to meet the following requirements.

- 1 The examination paper should be in three sections.
- 2 Each section will comprise four questions.
- 3 Candidates will be required to attempt two from four questions in each section.
- 4 The examination paper must cover both aspects of integration and problem solving from an operational and managerial perspective.
- 5 At least one aspect within each of the three topics areas of crops, livestock and mechanization should be covered.
- 6 Questions may be split into several parts and each part given a separate mark.
- Section 1 of the examination will comprise the subject area of crops with its associated mechanisation. Section 2 will comprise the subject area of livestock with its associated mechanisation. Section 3 will comprise of two parts: (Part A), two questions relating to quality issues relevant to the subject areas of crops, livestock and mechanisation and (Part B), two questions relating to environmental issues relevant to the subject areas of crops, livestock and mechanisation. The candidate must answer one question from part A and part B.

The examination will be marked out of 100. Assessors will aggregate the marks achieved by the candidate to arrive at an overall mark for the examination. Assessors will then assign a grade to the candidate for this Graded Unit based on the following grade boundaries:

- ♦ A = 70% 100%
- ♦ B = 60% 69%
- $\bullet$  C = 50% 59%

## Guidance on grading candidates

Candidates who meet the minimum Evidence Requirements will have their achievement graded as a C (competent), A (highly competent), or B (somewhere between A and C). The grade related criteria to be used to judge candidate performance for this Graded Unit is specified in the following table:

### **Support notes**

The subject areas to be examined may be drawn from the material covered by the Units listed in the Recommended Prior Knowledge and Skills section. As the questions integrate topics from different Units, problem solving skills are developed. An example could be where a candidate is required to explain the changes necessary to a dairy enterprise where it is decided to keep and rear the calves right through to slaughter, compared to current practice of selling calves at a week old. Candidates would be expected to refer to factors such as equipment and housing, nutrition, health and profitability. Another example could be the implications of an arable farmer entering a cereal quality scheme.

It is recommended that the examination is divided into separate sessions, with candidates having a break between sessions. Candidates will not be allowed to view the questions from another session until the start of that session.

It is recommended that the Graded Unit examination is delivered towards the end of the academic year, when the candidates will have completed the Units listed in Recommended Prior Knowledge and Skills.

It is recommended that during the delivery of the programme, the candidates are given an incremental introduction to the skills needed to undertake a closed-book examination. Students may gain experience of taking closed-book examinations in assessments given for Units studied prior to the Graded Unit.

The questions will be unseen until the time of the examination. The examination paper may be divided in three sessions, with a break allowed between the sessions. Where this is the case, you will only be permitted to see the sections which are being examined in that session.

To achieve this Graded Unit, candidates should attain 50% of the available marks with achievement being graded according to marks attained. The examination will be marked out of 100.
