Rationale

All new and revised National Courses reflect Curriculum for Excellence values, purposes and principles. They offer flexibility, provide more time for learning, more focus on skills and applying learning, and scope for personalisation and choice.

In this Course, and its component Units, there will be an emphasis on skills development and the application of those skills. Assessment approaches will be proportionate, fit for purpose and will promote best practice, enabling learners to achieve the highest standards they can.

This Course provides learners with opportunities to continue to acquire and develop the attributes and capabilities of the four capacities as well as skills for learning, skills for life and skills for work.

All Courses provide opportunities for learners to develop breadth, challenge and application, but the focus and balance of the assessment will be appropriate for the subject area.

Relationship between the Course and Curriculum for Excellence values, purposes and principles

The National 2 English and Communication Course builds on the principles and practice and experiences and outcomes for literacy and English.

The National 2 English and Communication Course enables learners to develop the ability to understand and use language. Our ability to use language to communicate lies at the centre of the development and expression of our emotions, our thinking, our learning and our sense of personal identity. Developing skills in reading, writing, talking and listening allows learners to engage fully in learning and to access the wider world.

Learners understand language through reading or listening to a wide range of texts. The Course will develop learners' ability to read, understand and respond to these texts in a variety of ways to show their understanding. Learners use language to communicate their ideas, thoughts and feelings for different purposes and for different audiences by creating a variety of texts.

The four literacy skills of reading, writing, talking and listening are of equal importance and the development of these skills will support learners in all aspects of the Course. These skills will enhance learners' ability to communicate their ideas, thoughts and feelings and to respond to those of other people.

Learners will also develop interpersonal and social skills through interacting with others and will build their confidence through communicating in group and individual situations.

Purpose and aims of the Course

This Course will develop learners' skills in reading, listening to and understanding texts, and in communicating their responses. The Course aims to enable learners to develop the ability to:

- understand and respond to simple word-based texts
- create simple word-based texts to communicate ideas, opinions or information
- listen and respond to simple spoken ideas, opinions or information
- communicate simple ideas, opinions or information

Course activities also provide opportunities for learners to develop broad, generic and transferable skills such as social and interpersonal skills and IT skills.

The integrative design of the Course will foster learners' language skills, helping them make links between reading and writing and listening and talking. Learners will apply their literacy skills in a variety of integrated contexts, such as talking and listening in the context of conversation.

Information about typical learners who might do the Course

This Course is suitable for all learners with an interest in English and communication. It is suitable for learners with a general interest in the subject and for those wanting to progress to higher levels of study.

The Course may also be suitable for those wishing to work towards a qualification in English for the first time.

This qualification will allow learners to consolidate and extend further the English and communication skills developed through the literacy and English experiences and outcomes.

The Course takes account of the needs of all learners by providing sufficient flexibility to enable learners to achieve in different ways and at a different pace.

On completing the Course, learners will have developed their skills in reading, writing, listening and talking, in understanding and using language, and in communicating their ideas, thoughts and feelings through a variety of texts.

The skills within this Course have applications in many other subject areas. Skills developed in this Course support progression to other curriculum areas, as well as to Personal Achievement Awards and Personal Development Awards.

Course structure and conditions of award

Course structure

This Course consists of three mandatory Units only. These Units provide both breadth and depth and, through their open contexts for learning, offer opportunities for personalisation and choice.

The Course enables learners to develop English and communication skills with a focus on: reading and responding to simple texts; listening and responding to simple spoken communication; and writing and talking to communicate ideas, opinions and information.

Units are statements of standards for assessment and not programmes of learning and teaching. They can be delivered in a number of ways.

English and Communication: Understanding Language (National 2)

The general aim of this Unit is to help learners to develop their skills in reading and understanding different types of word-based texts. Learners will demonstrate their understanding of language by responding to texts in different ways.

English and Communication: Creating Texts (National 2)

The general aim of this Unit is to help learners to develop their skills in communicating ideas, opinions and information by creating a variety of texts.

English and Communication: Listening and Talking (National 2)

The general aim of this Unit is to help learners to develop their skills in talking individually or in discussion. Learners will also develop their ability to respond to spoken communication.

Conditions of award

To achieve the National 2 English and Communication Course, the learner must pass all of the required Units. The required Units are shown in the Course outline section.

National 2 Courses are not graded.

Skills, knowledge and understanding

Full skills, knowledge and understanding for the Course are given in the *Course Support Notes*. A broad overview of the subject skills, knowledge and understanding that will be covered in the Course is given in this section. These include:

- understanding ideas, opinions and information by reading and listening to simple texts
- creating simple texts to communicate ideas, opinions and information
- knowledge of basic tools for language
- talking to communicate ideas, opinions and information
- listening to respond to ideas, opinions or information

Skills, knowledge and understanding to be included in the Course will be appropriate to the SCQF level of the Course. The SCQF level descriptors give further information on characteristics and expected performance at each SCQF level (www.sqa.org.uk/scqf).

They will be assessed on a pass/fail basis within centres. SQA will provide rigorous external quality assurance, including external verification, to ensure assessment judgments are consistent and meet national standards.
