Rationale

All new and revised National Courses reflect Curriculum for Excellence values, purposes and principles. They offer flexibility, provide more time for learning, more focus on skills and applying learning, and scope for personalisation and choice.

In this Course, and its component Units, there will be an emphasis on skills development and the application of those skills. Assessment approaches will be proportionate, fit for purpose and will promote best practice, enabling learners to achieve the highest standards they can.

This Course provides learners with opportunities to continue to acquire and develop the attributes and capabilities of the four capacities as well as skills for learning, skills for life and skills for work.

All Courses provide opportunities for learners to develop breadth, challenge and application, but the focus and balance of the assessment will be appropriate for the subject area.

Relationship between the Course and Curriculum for Excellence values, purposes and principles

The Modern Studies Course builds upon the principles and practices for social studies and will be developed primarily, although not exclusively, from the 'people in society, economy and business' organiser within the experiences and outcomes in the social studies curriculum area.

This Course will encourage learners to develop important attitudes including: an open mind and respect for the values, beliefs and cultures of others; openness to new thinking and ideas and a sense of responsibility and global citizenship.

This Course develops in learners a greater understanding of the contemporary world and their place in it. By studying this Course, learners are enabled to develop the four capacities in many respects. For example, learners' horizons are extended and they are challenged to look at the world in new ways. Their confidence can grow as they begin to understand more about their sense of identity and place in the contemporary world. Learners will build up a framework of social, political and economic knowledge and understanding which can help them develop a sense of responsible citizenship.

The investigative and critical thinking activities in this Course give learners important experience in contributing to group work and also working on their own. Learners will acquire attributes which will be important for their life and work.

Through the skills and content of this Course, learners will develop an increased understanding of the democratic political system and their place in it as well as a sense of responsible citizenship. The emphasis on the evaluation of sources and decisionmaking will develop thinking skills. Learners will also progressively develop skills in literacy and numeracy.

Purpose and aims of the Course

Modern Studies opens up the world of contemporary society for learners.

The purpose of Modern Studies is to develop the learner's knowledge and understanding of contemporary political and social issues in local, Scottish, United Kingdom and international contexts. In these contexts, learners will develop an awareness of the social and political issues they will meet in their lives. This purpose will be achieved through successful study of the three Units of the Course.

Through this Course, learners will undertake a coherent study of contemporary society with concepts and themes being revisited and built upon across Units. The Course will develop the skills to help learners interpret and participate in the social and political processes they will encounter now and in the future.

Modern Studies makes a distinctive contribution to the curriculum by drawing on the social sciences of politics, sociology and economics and where appropriate, of associated ideas drawn from other social subjects. It thereby adopts a multi-disciplinary approach.

The main aims of this Course are to enable learners to develop:

- a range of research and information handling skills
- detailed understanding of the democratic process
- detailed understanding of social and economic issues at local, Scottish, national and international levels and ways of addressing needs and inequalities
- understanding of different views about the extent of state involvement in society
- understanding of the nature and processes of conflict resolution
- understanding of human and legal rights and responsibilities and their application in different societies.

Information about typical learners who might do the Course

The Course is appropriate for a wide range of learners, from those who wish to achieve a greater understanding of contemporary society and their place in it, to learners who wish to progress to more specialised training or further education or employment.

Entry to this Course is at the discretion of the centre. However, it may be beneficial for the learner to have the skills and knowledge developed by relevant experiences and outcomes from the broad, general education or equivalent qualifications.

Through the successful completion of this Course, learners will develop a range of important and transferable skills including: researching, understanding and using a range of information/evidence on contemporary issues; evaluating information/ evidence in order to give detailed explanations while detecting exaggeration and selectivity in the use of facts; making decisions and drawing conclusions; constructing detailed arguments in a balanced and structured way; and communicating, by a variety of means, views, opinions, decisions and conclusions based on evidence.

Modern Studies Units and Courses are offered from SCQF level 3 to SCQF level 7. Vertical progression is possible through the levels of Modern Studies qualifications and lateral progression is possible to other qualifications in the Social Studies suite of Courses. The National 5 Modern Studies Course provides an entry qualification for further study, employment and training. This Course is a preparation for diverse range of occupations and careers.

Course structure and conditions of award

Course structure

This Course develops a range of cognitive skills. It encourages active learning in the process of developing an understanding of contemporary society. Learners will acquire and apply relevant knowledge. Through using a range of sources of information they will develop investigating, evaluating and analysing skills in order to understand and explain political and social and international issues.

By undertaking this Course, learners will develop a wide range of important and transferable skills, including researching, understanding and using a range of information/evidence on contemporary issues; evaluating information/ evidence in order to give detailed explanations while detecting exaggeration and selectivity in the use of facts; making decisions, and drawing conclusions; constructing detailed arguments in a balanced and structured way; and communicating, by a variety of means, views, opinions, decisions and conclusions based on evidence.

The skills listed above will be developed and applied over a range of political, social and international contexts in the following Units. Each Unit also offers opportunities for learners to focus on particular skills.

The Modern Studies Course has three mandatory Units. Within each Unit there is a considerable degree of flexibility in themes which can be studied to allow personalisation and choice.

Units are statements of standards for assessment and not programmes of learning and teaching. They can be delivered in a number of ways.

The principles above will be applied in the Units below:

Modern Studies: Democracy in Scotland and the United Kingdom (National 5)

In this Unit, learners will develop skills by using sources of information in order to detect and explain examples of exaggeration and selectivity in the use of facts. Learners will develop a detailed knowledge and understanding of democracy in Scotland and the United Kingdom. They will develop a knowledge and understanding of the UK political structure including the place of Scotland within this and the debates around this arrangement. Learners will then have a choice of contexts for study which will be drawn from **either** the Scottish political system **or** the UK political system. Learners will develop knowledge and understanding of the main institutions and organisations which make up political life in their chosen context. They will develop knowledge and understanding of the ways in which society is informed about the political system, and able to participate in, and influence, the political system. They will develop an understanding of their rights and responsibilities in contemporary democratic political society.

Modern Studies: Social Issues in the United Kingdom (National 5)

In this Unit, learners will develop skills by using sources of information in order to make and give detailed justifications of decisions. Learners will develop detailed knowledge and understanding of social issues in the United Kingdom. They have a choice of social issues within Scotland and the UK. Contexts for study will focus on **either** social inequality **or** crime and the law. In the social inequality context, learners will focus on a specific aspect of contemporary social inequality in the UK. They will develop knowledge and understanding of the causes and consequences of social inequality and attempts by government, other organisations and individuals to tackle it. In the crime and the law context, learners will develop knowledge and understanding of the causes of crime, the impact of crime on individuals and society and the role of individuals, the police, the legal system and the state in tackling crime.

Modern Studies: International Issues (National 5)

In this Unit, learners will develop skills by using sources of information in order to draw and give detailed support for conclusions. Learners will develop a detailed knowledge and understanding of international issues. They have a choice of contexts for study. Contexts for study can be **either** a socio/economic and political study of a significant world power **or** a contemporary world issue. The study of a significant world power will focus on contemporary socio-economic issues and a study of its political system. The study of a world issue will focus on a significant contemporary issue, its causes and consequences, and attempts at resolution.

Conditions of award

To gain the award of the Course, the learner must pass all the Units as well as the Course assessment. The required Units are shown in the Course outline section. Course assessment will provide the basis for grading attainment in the Course award.

Skills, knowledge and understanding

Further information on skills, knowledge and understanding for the Course will be given in the *Course Assessment Specification*. A broad overview of the mandatory subject skills, knowledge and understanding that will be assessed in the Course is given in this section.

This covers:

- developing and applying detailed skills, knowledge and understanding in political, social or international contexts
- with guidance, researching and using information collected from a range of sources about contemporary issues which are mostly familiar
- using a range of sources of information to detect and explain exaggeration and selectivity in the use of facts in mostly familiar political contexts
- giving detailed justifications for decisions made in mostly familiar social contexts using a range of sources of information
- giving detailed support for valid conclusions drawn from a range of sources of information about mostly familiar international issues
- demonstrating knowledge and understanding of the main democratic processes, institutions and organisations which make up political life in Scotland and/or the UK by giving factual descriptions and detailed explanations
- demonstrating knowledge and understanding of a major social issue in Scotland and the UK focusing on either social inequality or crime and the law by giving factual descriptions and detailed explanations
- demonstrating knowledge and understanding of an international issue relating to a either a significant world power or contemporary world issue by giving factual descriptions and detailed explanations

Skills, knowledge and understanding to be included in the Course will be appropriate to the SCQF level of the Course. The SCQF level descriptors give further information on characteristics and expected performance at each SCQF level (<u>www.sqa.org.scqf</u>).

Assessment

Information about assessment for the Course is included in the *Course Assessment Specification* which provides full details including advice on how a learner's overall attainment for the Course will be determined.

Unit assessment

All Units are internally assessed against the requirements shown in the Unit Specifications.

They can be assessed on an individual Unit basis or by using other approaches which combine the assessment for more than one Unit.

They will be assessed on a pass/fail basis within centres. SQA will provide rigorous external quality assurance, including external verification, to ensure assessment judgements are consistent and meet national standards.

The assessment of the Units in this Course will be as follows:

Modern Studies: Democracy in Scotland and the United Kingdom (National 5)

The learner will be required to give evidence of:

- ability to use a range of sources of information to detect and explain exaggeration and selectivity in the use of facts drawn from political issues in Scotland and the UK which are mostly familiar but may include some aspects which are new
- descriptions and detailed explanations demonstrating knowledge and understanding, which is mainly factual but has some theoretical content, of political issues in Scotland and the United Kingdom

Modern Studies: Social Issues in the United Kingdom (National 5)

The learner will be required to give evidence of:

- ability to use a range of sources of information to make and give detailed justifications of decisions about social issues in the United Kingdom which are mostly familiar but may include some aspects which are new
- descriptions and detailed explanations demonstrating knowledge and understanding, which is mainly factual but has some theoretical content, of social issues in Scotland and the United Kingdom drawn from either the context of social inequality in the United Kingdom or crime and the law in the United Kingdom

Modern Studies: International Issues (National 5)

The learner will be required to give evidence of:

- ability to use a range of sources of information to draw and give detailed support for valid conclusions about international issues which are mostly familiar but may include some aspects which are new
- descriptions and detailed explanations demonstrating knowledge and understanding, which is mainly factual but has some theoretical content, of international issues drawn from either the study of socio/economic and political issues in a significant world power or a contemporary world issue

Course assessment

Courses from National 4 to Advanced Higher include assessment of <u>added value</u>¹. At National 5, Higher and Advanced Higher, the added value will be assessed in the <u>Course assessment</u>². The added value for the Course must address the key purposes and aims of the Course as defined in the Course Rationale. It will do this by addressing one or more of breadth, challenge or application.

In the National 5 Modern Studies Course, added value will focus on:

- breadth
- challenge
- application

The learner will draw on, extend and apply the skills, knowledge and understanding they have acquired during the Course. This will be assessed by a <u>question paper</u>³ and an <u>assignment</u>⁴. The question paper will require demonstration of a breadth of skills, knowledge and understanding from across the Course. The assignment will require learners to extend and apply their skills, knowledge and understanding and will be sufficiently open and flexible to allow for personalisation and choice.
