Credit value

The SCQF level 6 Course in Photography is allocated 24 SCQF credit points at SCQF level 6*.

**SCQF points are used to allocate credit to qualifications in the Scottish Credit and Qualifications Framework (SCQF). Each qualification is allocated a number of SCQF credit points at an SCQF level. There are 12 SCQF levels, ranging from Access 1 to Doctorates.*

Rationale

Photography has an increasingly significant core function within the Creative Industries and also within the commercial and scientific community in Scotland. Employment opportunities in Photography continue in Scotland, but the required skill set has changed to reflect technological advances in the subject and the prevalence of digital photography, combined with the demands of employers for a technologically aware and flexible workforce.

The camera has become both a tool and medium in almost every area of the Creative Industries. Fine Art practitioners are now embracing digital imaging technology and using it as a medium in its own right, or combining it with conventional photographic techniques.

The Photography Course at SCQF level 6 offers candidates the opportunities for an integrated, hands-on, skill development with clear exit paths to employment or progression onto further and/or higher education.

Photography: Reportage

This Unit is designed to enable candidates to acquire knowledge of the skills involved in producing a photographic essay or photo story. Candidates will develop the ability to apply a thematic approach to a given brief, where a series of images will be produced to tell a story.

Assessment

To achieve the Course award the candidate must achieve the Units as well as pass the Course assessment. The candidate's grade is based on the Course assessment. Candidates must provide evidence that they have achieved the requirements of all of the Outcomes and Performance Criteria of the Units.

Assessment objectives

The key elements of the Photography Course at SCQF level 6 are knowledge, understanding, and practical skills. There is assessment of:

- ◆ camera techniques
- ◆ photographic and manipulation techniques
- ◆ planning
- ◆ investigative research
- ◆ critical thinking and evaluating skills

Course assessment

The external course assessment is based on a Practical Assignment.

To gain the award for the Course candidates must have completed all of the prescribed Units, and must be able to generate reliable evidence, capable of being authenticated and assessed externally.

With Project-based National Courses the induction and the preparation for external assessment should focus on preparing candidates for project work, by ensuring they have the skills required to carry out the project. This should take approximately 10 hours, leaving the remaining time for candidates to carry out the project work and produce their assessment evidence. This means that the time allowed for the completion of Course assessments in project-based National Courses is approximately 30 hours of supervised time, with any additional work carried out in candidates' own time.

Although all National Courses are externally assessed, centres are responsible for managing the arrangements leading up to external assessment. For Project-based National Courses this means responsibility for organising the production of candidates' project evidence and then presenting or submitting the evidence to SQA for external assessment.

Project-based National Courses must generate reliable assessment decisions. It is important therefore to ensure that evidence arising from projects can be authenticated as candidates' own work.

Marking and grading Project-based National Courses

The assessment evidence for Project-based National Courses is marked externally by SQA.

The total mark for the project is 200. This reflects the comparative size or weight of these projects when compared to projects embedded in National Courses which are largely question paper based. It also allows Markers to discriminate between levels of performance in each stage of the project.

These marks will be allocated to assessment evidence from the three project stages as follows:

Project stage	Assessment Evidence	Mark Allocation
Plan of Action	Plan of Action maximum 1000 words (minimum 500)	40
Development	Evidence arising from the hands-on practical activity and from documenting the underpinning processes involved	120
Evaluation	Extended evaluation report maximum 1000 words	40

To underpin this assessment system there are criteria to which marks are pegged, against which the candidate evidence from each of the three Practical Assignment stages is assessed. The use of such mark categories linked to broad criteria, allows for the aggregation of the various parts of the assessment which do not necessarily have the same weighting in the overall grade. Estimates and appeals

Although Project-based National Courses are externally assessed by SQA Markers, candidates will benefit from estimate grades based on accurate internal assessment of their projects, ie the grade that assessors' judge a candidate should be awarded, based on all the available evidence.

The processes for deciding an estimate grade are similar to the processes the Markers would use for the final assessment. The main benefit of an estimate to an individual candidate is that an appeal can be submitted against an external decision where the estimate given the candidate was at grade C or better. An appeal will not normally be considered for candidates for whom no estimate has been received. SQA will provide a form for submission of estimates.

For the internal marking process for estimates, internal assessors are expected to:

- ◆ compare candidate evidence arising from each stage of the Practical Assignment to the criteria outlined, and decide on the mark category which most accurately describes it
- ◆ decide on a particular mark for the candidate within that broad mark category for each stage, depending on how marginal the decision was
- ◆ maintain a brief record of why a certain mark was given for each of the three Practical Assignment stages (for internal verification purposes)
- ◆ follow the internal verification processes within their centre
- ◆ aggregate the internally verified marks for each candidate. That gives a total mark out of 200
- ◆ divide that total mark by two to give a percentage
- ◆ convert the overall % mark for each candidate into an estimated grade and a band using the following table

- ◆ provide estimates as bands

The evidence

The *Notes of Information for Teachers/Lecturers for the Project-based National Course: Photography – Higher* document is circulated to centres annually in March. This contains specific information on submitting candidate evidence. Where materials have to be sent to SQA for marking, labels, flyleaves and envelopes will be distributed to centres.

The following must be sent to SQA for the Practical Assignment:

- ◆ plan of action
- ◆ all transportable evidence
- ◆ extended evaluation report

Quality assurance

All National Courses are subject to external marking and/or verification. External Markers, Visiting Examiners and Verifiers are trained by SQA to apply national standards.

The Units of all Courses are subject to internal verification and may also be chosen for external verification. This is to ensure that national standards are being applied across all subjects.

Guidance on learning and teaching approaches for this Course

Units can be delivered separately from the Practical Assignment, but it is also possible to integrate some or all Units and/or individual Outcomes into the Practical Assignment. This is particularly helpful to centres where there are time constraints. Integration of Units will promote coherence, relevance and depth of study.

Centres should note that Performance Criteria for Units require candidates to demonstrate basic competency. When integrating Units into the Practical Assignment, centres must ensure that assessment requirements for the Practical Assignment are met both in terms of quantity and quality.

It should be noted that while candidate work in digital format is acceptable assessment evidence for Units, this is not the case with the Practical Assignment. Product evidence must be submitted in the form of research material, contact sheets/enprints, photographic prints, etc and organised in an appropriate format.

In the selection of Practical Assignment themes, centres should ensure that the chosen theme and interpretation allow both the Practical Assignment and the integrated Units to be completed successfully.

Centres should ensure that integrated Unit work submitted for assessment is relevant to the candidate's chosen theme and approach to the Practical Assignment. The inclusion of Unit work which does not relate to the candidate's Practical Assignment may affect the coherence of the project. Unit evidence which does not relate directly to the Practical Assignment must be retained in the centre for verification purposes and should not be submitted to SQA.

The following tables are designed to assist centres who choose to take this approach. Centres must also refer to the Performance Criteria and evidence requirements for each Outcome to ensure that assessment criteria are fulfilled. Details are contained in the Unit Specifications and NABs.

Practical Assignment

Selection of a theme

Centres are reminded that themes are deliberately broad to allow for personal interpretation. Centres should encourage candidates to consider particular aspects of their theme, which may be more effective and realistic than trying to cover it in its entirety.

Approaches to themes

Centres should ensure that the approach selected is appropriate to the theme and not too tenuous. Candidates must be able to justify why their selected approach fits into this theme. Centres should be mindful that candidates may have preconceived ideas which limit their creativity.

It is recommended that candidates do not select assignments which are totally unrealistic in terms of accessibility. Candidates should ensure that they consider the limitations of their equipment when selecting assignments; candidates should be aware of the limitations of using an inexpensive camera. It should also be noted that expensive camera equipment does not always make for a better quality of photograph.

Health and safety, legal and welfare issues

Centres have a responsibility to ensure that candidates do not select approaches which may place them in danger or involve them in illegal activities. Candidates should be made aware of any legal implications, eg use of model release forms for under 16s.

Plan of Action

Candidates should ensure that:

- ◆ the work carried out in the Practical Assignment reflects the original Plan
- ◆ the Plan is clear, concise and written in the future tense
- ◆ they work within the word limit (max 1000; min 500).

Development - Research

Candidates should include physical evidence of their research – a list of websites is not acceptable. Centres should encourage candidates to engage with their research material eg annotations, sketches, etc. The research should inform and underpin candidates' work. Candidates should be encouraged to explore a variety of appropriate research sources and include details of these sources.

Development – Photographic work

Candidates must ensure that a substantial body of work is presented which demonstrates evidence that they have engaged with the process – one or two contact sheets will not suffice. Centres should encourage candidates to interact with their work. Their thought processes should be evident at this stage.

Centres should ensure that the format chosen allows candidates' work to arrive at SQA intact. Sketchbooks, workbooks, and display books work well. A4 ring binders can fall apart in transit. Contents should be clearly labelled and packaged together in an appropriate and secure manner.

Presentation of Development work

Centres are advised to include an edited selection of candidates' work. Ensure that everything sent for external assessment is relevant to the assessment criteria for the Practical Assignment.

Centres are advised not to over edit – for instance, it is helpful to see evidence of (relevant) photo shoots which were less successful, if it is clear that the candidate has learned from the experience.

Candidates should be encouraged to present their work in a logical, coherent and organised format and it should be very clear where the final 12 images have originated in the candidate's development work.

Candidates working in colour must make sure that their contact sheets are also in colour.

Guidance on approaches to assessment

Selection of the final 12 images

Centres are advised to build in some quality control procedures, eg peer assessment, critiques/interim assessment, so that candidates are more aware of what makes a successful image when they make their final selection.

Candidates should be encouraged to consider variety and avoid repetition of images/ideas. Centres are reminded that much of the mark is dependent on the success of the final 12 images.

Editing and enhancement

Centres should encourage candidates to exercise restraint – images can be ruined by over sharpening, for instance, or in overdoing other digital effects. Candidates should be reminded that out of focus images cannot be ‘fixed’ on the computer.

Printing the final images

All prints must be of photographic quality. In traditional photography, prints should be blemish free. Digital images should not be printed on copier paper or with poorly calibrated printers. It is acceptable to outsource printing. Prints need not be A4 size if cost is a factor; the minimum size is A5. Centres should consider resolution when deciding on print size.

Presentation of the final 12 prints

Candidates must present their final images neatly and ‘professionally’ using suitable adhesives and mounts. It is not advisable to use a wet adhesive; double-sided tape is a suitable option. Candidates should mount their work using a common orientation. Titles should not be added to photographs – they should speak for themselves. Prints must be able to be viewed clearly, eg avoid high gloss display books for final prints.

Evaluation

Candidates should be supported and given guidance on how to complete the evaluation, eg a list of questions or a structure to follow. Candidates must ensure that they balance discussion of the effectiveness of the process with consideration of the success of the final 12 images. Encourage analytical and evaluative responses rather than purely descriptive ones. Encourage holistic evaluation rather than an evaluation of each final image; ensure candidates consider the images as a group.

Candidates are encouraged to identify weaknesses as well as strengths, and should refer to their original plan; did they do what they set out to do? Candidates should also be reminded to keep to the maximum word limit (1000).

It is not advisable for candidates to produce work that does not add value, eg mock-ups of calendars, graphic designs etc if the time would be more appropriately spent on their photographic work.

This Unit is designed to enable candidates to acquire a broad-based knowledge and understanding of the basic techniques involved in photography, and an understanding of the basic features of a camera. Candidates will be given the opportunity to develop skills/knowledge of exposure, composition and framing.

Candidates will cover the basic concept of image formation and light. They should develop an understanding and be able to use the features of the camera they are using, and produce images to an acceptable quality to meet the assignments or achieve the Outcomes.

Guidance on learning and teaching approaches for this Unit

Outcomes 1, 2, 3 and 4 will benefit from teacher/lecturer or peer group discussion where candidates are given the opportunity to discuss the work and can be questioned in areas they may have failed to notice or consider as possible areas of investigation. Working in this way will allow candidates to learn from each other and broaden their understanding of the images and develop critical thinking skills.

Outcomes 1 and 2 are likely to be teacher/lecturer led on a formal basis with candidates gaining some hands-on practical experience in Outcome 2.

Outcomes 3 and 4 involves the examination of examples of photographic images produced by candidates in conjunction with practical product based exercises.

Opportunities for developing Core Skills

There are opportunities to develop aspects of the Core Skill of *Communication* (SCQF level 4) through participation in group discussion, critiques and analysis of the candidate's own work.

Candidates do not have to work within a darkroom and commercial image output is acceptable. The emphasis should be on the capture of images demonstrating a range of tonal situations/lighting conditions with due regard to compositional elements. All images produced may be by traditional or digital means as long as all Performance Criteria are met.

Guidance on the content and context for this Unit

This Unit has been designed as a mandatory Unit of the Photography Course at SCQF level 6. It may also be taken as a freestanding Unit.

This Unit is designed to enable candidates to engage in a photographic research project in a creative, structured way. Candidates will investigate a photographic theme and use problem solving techniques to produce effective research material and evidence of the creative use of techniques. Candidates will present the completed work in a suitable format. Candidates will reflect on their own work and research.

The intention is to provide an opportunity for candidates to participate in an area of specialist study, of which they may have no previous experience and to allow them to explore that area creatively. To this end, it is recommended that consideration is given to providing creative and imaginative briefs and projects if completing as a freestanding Unit.

Teachers/lecturers should be aware that the assessment of the work is in terms of technical ability as well as creative approach to the subject.

Candidates will be encouraged to investigate photographic techniques, equipment and materials creatively.

Candidates should be directed to an area and a brief which is realistically within their capabilities. Available equipment should also be taken into account when selecting a brief.

Outcome 1

The brief should cover both the instructions set out in finding the solution to a design problem, and the sort of project which might be set for candidates to explore a photographic theme. In any case, it should be imaginative, and allow for individual creativity as well as the opportunity to demonstrate technical ability in photography.

Outcome 2

The different areas of photography may require different approaches in terms of selection of equipment and use of techniques, eg sports photography is a very different discipline from studio based still-life. Landscape requires a different approach to macro photography of flowers and insects.

Outcome 3

The collated materials either produced or gathered by candidates should relate to the given brief. The subsequent editing and annotation should clarify the theme and show engagement by each candidate with the research.

The teacher/lecturer should ensure that the techniques, equipment and materials required for the successful completion of the candidate's chosen brief are available and accessible within the centre's resources.

The research project should be presented using a coherent and logical structure. The folio of work should be collated in an annotated workbook. Candidates will benefit from having a clear idea of the format required from the outset of the project and exemplification would be helpful at the start.

Opportunities for developing Core Skills

If using electronic formats for their research, the candidate would have the opportunity to develop aspects of the Core Skill of *Information and Communication Technology*.

In this Unit the candidate will follow a brief to solve a problem, demonstrate knowledge and understanding of investigation and research skills producing examples and evaluating their own skills. This offers ideal opportunities to develop aspects of the Core Skill of *Problem Solving*.

Working in this way will allow the candidates to learn from each other and broaden their understanding of the brief and develop critical thinking skills. Checklists could be used to record candidate progress during formative stages of assessment.

Outcome 1

Candidates will be given a brief to follow and must show that they have gathered a wide range of relevant research material related to the chosen theme. An appropriate Instrument of Assessment will be the candidate's gathered research in response to the brief. Evidence may be in the form of annotated sketches, drawings, or photographs.

Outcome 2

Candidates are required to determine and creatively use the most appropriate photographic techniques, materials and equipment to produce their own examples of photographic work related to the chosen theme and requirements of the brief. An appropriate Instrument of Assessment will be the candidate's own photographic work produced in response to the brief.

Outcome 3

Candidates will edit and select an appropriate body of work from the research and investigation materials, gathered and/or produced which will be collated, edited and presented in a workbook with appropriate annotation throughout. An appropriate Instrument of Assessment will be the finished, annotated folio of work.

Outcome 4

Candidates will evaluate the finished work. Assessment will be in the form of a written and/or oral evaluation of 500 words. Teachers/lecturers may wish to provide a pro forma for this assessment which gives candidates a basic structure or series of questions to answer.

In the production of each of the three images candidates must demonstrate their ability to utilise the relevant techniques.

Prints will be a minimum size A5.

Written and/or oral explanation of procedures used for manipulating images through the use of the enlarger or appropriate software, across all techniques specified, is required.

Outcome 4

One image must be produced by the candidate for each of the following two techniques:

- (i) Pseudo-solarisation.
- (ii) Toning — any **one** of the following techniques:
 - single colour toning
 - multi-colour toning
 - hand tinting
 - selenium toning

In the production of the two images candidates must demonstrate their ability to utilise the relevant techniques.

Prints will be a minimum size A5.

Written and/or oral explanation of procedures used for manipulating images through use of selected chemicals or techniques across the techniques specified is required.

The National Assessment Bank (NAB) pack provided for this Unit illustrates the standard that should be applied. It contains an assessor checklist. If a centre wishes to design its own assessments for this Unit, they must be of a comparable standard.

National Unit specification: support notes

Unit title: Photography: Creative Image Making Techniques
(SCQF level 6)

This part of the Unit specification is offered as guidance. The support notes are not mandatory.

While the exact time allocated to this Unit is at the discretion of the centre, the notional design length is 40 hours.

Guidance on the content and context for this Unit

This Unit has been designed as an optional Unit of the Photography Course at SCQF level 6. It may also be taken as a freestanding Unit.

The aim is for candidates to gain a knowledge and understanding of a range of image manipulation techniques. *Candidates will produce evidence which will include an annotated workbook which contains a range of given manipulated images and descriptions about the equipment and techniques used along with eight finished manipulated images.*

Outcome 1

Performance Criteria (a) and (b) — the images presented for identification should clearly reflect the results of manipulative techniques used by practising photographers. The images could be collected from magazines, newspapers, past photographs, etc. The images can be presented individually or collectively, and could have a means of identification (ie number, letter) for assessment purposes.

Outcome 2

Performance Criteria (c) — appropriate special effect filters should be made available to the candidate, ie Split Image, Red/Orange and Star Burst filters.

Several photographs may be taken by the candidate but it is only necessary to print three selected images.

Outcome 3

The suitability of the images used for this Outcome should be agreed with the teacher/lecturer. The images may be produced specifically for this Outcome, or could be those produced in Outcome 1. Alternatively they could have been produced independently of this Unit (ie for the Unit *Photography: Research Project* or candidate's portfolio).

Performance Criteria (b) — appropriate texture screens should be made available to the candidate. Texture screens used should be suitable for the format used.

Unit title: Photography: Creative Image Making Techniques

Outcome 4

Safe working practices should be emphasised in this Outcome. The proper processes for using chemicals must be maintained.

The suitability of the images used for this Outcome should be agreed with the teacher/lecturer. As with Outcome 2 these can be produced specifically for this Outcome or can be those produced in Outcome 2, or independently of this Unit.

Chemicals appropriate to the function should be made available to the candidate.

Throughout this Unit safety must be stressed. Safe working practices should be an integral part of all the activities.

Guidance on learning and teaching approaches for this Unit

Outcomes 1, 2, 3 and 4 will benefit from teacher/lecturer or peer group discussion where candidates are given the opportunity to discuss the work and can be questioned in areas they may have failed to notice or consider as possible areas of investigation. Working in this way will allow candidates to learn from each other and broaden their understanding of the images and develop critical thinking skills.

A candidate centred resource based learning approach is recommended. During the work of the Unit candidates should have several opportunities to develop their practical skills, and should be assessed at appropriate points throughout delivery of the work. Candidates will benefit from teacher/lecturer demonstration at key points in the Unit. Appropriate terminology should be presented in context throughout the Unit.

Where candidates are unsuccessful in achieving an Outcome, provision should be made for remediation and reassessment.

Opportunities for developing Core Skills

There are opportunities to develop aspects of the Core Skill of *Communication* at SCQF level 4 through participation in group discussion, critiques and analysis of the candidate's own work.

Guidance on approaches to assessment for this Unit

Centres may use Instruments of Assessment which are considered to be most appropriate. Examples of Instruments of Assessment which could be used to generate and gather evidence of achievement are as follows.

Outcome 1

An appropriate Instrument of Assessment would be a restricted response style questionnaire. Candidates should be presented with a selection of images exemplifying the different techniques (camera equipment control, use of shutter speeds, and use of special filters). Satisfactory achievement of this Outcome would be based on candidates correctly identifying the processes utilised in 75% of these images.

Guidance on the content and context for this Unit

This Unit has been designed as an optional Unit of the Photography Course at SCQF level 6. It may also be taken as a freestanding Unit.

This Unit is designed to enable candidates to acquire the skills necessary to produce a photographic essay or photo story.

Candidates will develop the ability to apply a thematic approach to a given brief, where a series of images will be produced to tell a story.

The intention is to provide an opportunity for candidates with some experience of photography to respond to a given brief and demonstrate effective choices of theme, equipment, techniques and approach in developing and producing a series of thematic, photographic images. The exercises undertaken in the study of this Unit will give adequate opportunity for candidates to creatively research the subject of Reportage and apply knowledge and skills of photographic techniques acquired to their own work.

Health and safety guidance relating to studio practice and location work should be given. Candidates will be expected to adopt safe working practices at all times.

Guidance on learning and teaching approaches for this Unit

Candidates will be presented with an integrative practical exercise to assess their ability to carry out a photo reportage assignment (telling a story in photographic form).

This centre devised brief should be used as the starting point to generate research which should be individual in nature and lead the candidate on a personal line of enquiry. Suitable briefs could include *current affairs*, *environmental issues*, *sporting events*, etc.

Exemplar material of a relevant standard could be made available for review and discussion at Unit induction, as this would support candidates' understanding of the Unit requirements before embarking on the project.

It would also be advantageous for candidates to become familiar with the work of 'Photo Reportage' photographers by viewing publications and exhibitions, where possible, in order to become aware of differing photographic styles.

Analysis of the brief should be carried out by candidates, enabling them to analyse the constraints and requirements of the brief, identify the key issues and interpret and decide upon an individual line of enquiry. This will help candidates to plan the process and manage their timescales for completion of the key project stages.

A candidate-centred resource-based learning approach is recommended. During the work of the Unit, candidates should have a number of opportunities to develop their practical skills and should be assessed at appropriate points.

The teacher/lecturer should demonstrate how to select appropriate equipment and techniques for the production of a series of thematic images. A demonstration on effective ways of editing/cropping/printing the images for the final presentation should be given.

Through the development and planning of the work in response to the given brief candidates will have the opportunity to develop the Core Skill of *Problem Solving*.

Guidance on approaches to assessment for this Unit

A suitable Instrument of Assessment for this Unit will be a practical exercise(s) and written and/or oral evidence. This Unit will allow candidates to be supported throughout the process and allow them time to develop any areas that would benefit from further study and investigation.

Outcome 1

Assessment of this Outcome will be written and/or oral evidence to include a basic plan that clarifies issues of the brief (theme, feasibility; timescale/deadline; location; specific requirements; freedom of interpretation; colour/monochrome; digital/traditional image).

This Outcome will benefit from teacher/lecturer or peer group discussion where candidates are given the opportunity to discuss their research of the brief and can be questioned in areas they may have failed to notice or consider as possible lines of investigation. Working in this way will allow candidates to learn from each other and broaden their understanding of the brief and develop critical thinking skills. Checklists can be used to record candidate progress during formative stages of assessment.

This Unit is designed to encourage candidates in the application of digital imaging techniques. The intention is to provide an opportunity for candidates to participate in this area of study at a reasonable level for a person with a limited experience of photography. It is recommended that exercises undertaken in the study of this Unit gives adequate opportunity for candidates to explore the subject and to be creative.

The following information gives further clarification regarding the context in which Outcomes and Performance Criteria are to be achieved.

Outcome 1

- PC(b) File size will be dependant on the final image output size and quality required.
- PC(d) File type, eg RAW, TIFF, JPEG, etc will be dependant on image software being used, eg Photoshop, Lightroom, etc. The teacher/lecturer can provide images for this task.

Outcome 2

- PC(d) Original images should be retained as evidence.
Images should be saved with the layers to allow for assessment, therefore an appropriate file format must be selected.

Outcome 3

For the Evidence Requirement in this Outcome, candidates should save all their work into an appropriate storage device, eg flash drive, USB memory stick, etc.

Outcome 4
