	Analyse how the writer uses both imagery and sentence structure to convey the appeal of future in-store shopping.	4
5.	Read lines 31–39.	
	By referring to at least two examples, analyse how the writer uses language to convey the impact of online retailers on shopping.	4
6.	Read lines 40–42.	
	Explain the function of these lines in the development of the writer's argument. You should make close reference to the passage in your answer.	2
7.	Read lines 43–52.	
	Explain fully why Bill Grimsey believes towns can regenerate themselves. Use your own words in your answer.	3
8.	Read lines 53–59.	
	By referring to at least two examples, analyse how the writer uses language to create an optimistic tone.	3
