## Introduction

This document contains marking instructions and instructions for candidates for the Higher Fashion and Textile Technology assignment. You must read it in conjunction with the course specification.

The assignment has 46 marks out of a total of 127 marks available for the course assessment, which is 35% of the total.

There are three course assessment components. The other components are a question paper worth 45 marks, which is 35% of the total and a practical activity worth 36 marks, which is 30% of the total.

The assignment has two stages:

♦ Stage 1: design (38 marks)

♦ Stage 2: evaluation (8 marks)

Candidates must use one of the briefs published annually by SQA, and provided separately in the *Fashion and Textile Technology Assignment assessment task brief*, as the basis for their assignment.

Candidates carry out one task — designing and evaluating a complex fashion/textile item.

The assignment is a written exercise only, no physical item or solution has to be made.

SQA provides a mandatory template for the assignment.

# Marking instructions

In line with SQA's normal practice, the following marking instructions for the Higher Fashion and Textile Technology assignment are addressed to the marker. They will also be helpful if you are preparing candidates for course assessment.

Both stages of the assignment (stage 1: design and stage 2: evaluation) are submitted to SQA for marking.

All marking is quality assured by SQA.

### General marking principles

Always apply these general principles. Use them in conjunction with the detailed marking instructions, which identify the key features required in candidates' responses.

- a Always use positive marking. This means candidates accumulate marks for the demonstration of relevant skills, knowledge and understanding; marks are not deducted for errors or omissions.
- b If a candidate response does not seem to be covered by either the principles or detailed marking instructions, and you are uncertain how to assess it, you must seek guidance from your team leader.
- c Award marks according to the accuracy and relevance of candidates' evidence.

## Instructions for candidates

This assessment applies to the assignment for Higher Fashion and Textile Technology.

The assignment has 46 marks out of a total of 127 marks available for the course assessment.

It assesses the following skills, knowledge and understanding:

- ♦ research skills
- evaluation skills

The assignment has two stages:

- stage 1: design (38 marks)
- stage 2: evaluation (8 marks)

Your teacher or lecturer will let you know if there are any specific conditions for doing this assessment.

You must use one of the briefs published annually by SQA as the basis for your assignment. These are provided separately in the *Fashion and Textile Technology Assignment:* assessment task brief.

In this assessment, you will plan a complex fashion/textile item, then test and evaluate the suitability of the item for the brief. The assignment is a written exercise only, no physical item or solution has to be made.

Once you have chosen your brief, you must carry out the following stages in this order.

#### Stage 1: design (38 marks)

You will gain marks for:

- 1a explaining two key themes to investigate, identified from your chosen brief
- 1b providing evidence of carrying out **three** investigations into the key themes, using different research techniques
- 1c presenting and justifying an appropriate solution for a complex fashion/textile item, based on the investigations, with 14 features which refer to the findings from the investigation

The evidence you provide for this stage must include:

- evidence from your investigations, in an appropriate format
- your solution for the planned fashion/textile item, for example annotated diagrams, illustrations, descriptions, samples of fabrics and components, so that the item can be clearly visualised
- justification of why the planned fashion/textile item meets the needs of the brief

#### Stage 2: evaluation (8 marks)

You will gain marks for:

- 2a carrying out an appropriate test on the solution to provide relevant information about the suitability of the design
- 2b evaluating the fashion/textile item, based on the results of testing and linked to the requirements of the brief
- 2c justifying amendments that might be made to the item based on the information gathered in the test

Your evidence for this stage must include:

- ♦ the results of your testing
- your completed evaluation
- your justification for suggested changes

When you have completed all of the stages, you must submit your work for marking. Your teacher or lecturer will tell you the submission date.

Your assignment will be sent to SQA for marking.
