# National 5 Fashion and Textile Technology Assignment Assessment task

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# Introduction

This document contains marking instructions and instructions for candidates for the National 5 Fashion and Textile Technology assignment. It must be read in conjunction with the course specification.

The assignment is worth 45 marks. The marks contribute 35% of the overall marks for the course assessment.

There are three course assessment components. The other components are a question paper worth 30 marks, which contributes 30% of the overall mark for the course assessment and a practical activity worth 45 marks, which contributes 35% of the overall mark for the course assessment.

The assignment has two stages:

Stage 1 - design and plan - 35 marks Stage 2 - testing and evaluation - 10 marks

Candidates will carry out one task — planning and evaluating a fashion/textile item. The assignment is a written exercise only, no physical item or solution has to be made.

Candidates must use the National 5 Fashion and Textile Technology Assignment Candidate workbook to present their assignment.

Candidates must use one of the briefs published annually by SQA and provided separately in the *Fashion and Textile Technology Assignment assessment task brief*, as the basis for their assignment.

Candidates have a choice of briefs. Briefs at National 5 have two themes for the candidate to investigate.

# **Marking instructions**

In line with SQA's normal practice, the following marking instructions are addressed to the marker. They will also be helpful for those preparing candidates for course assessment.

Both stages (Assignment: stage 1 - design and plan, and stage 2 - testing and evaluation), will be submitted to SQA for marking.

## General marking principles

This information is provided to help you understand the general principles you must apply when marking candidate responses in the assignment. These principles must be read in conjunction with the detailed marking instructions, which identify the key features required in candidate responses.

- a Marks for each candidate response must **always** be assigned in line with these general marking principles and the detailed marking instructions for this assessment.
- b Marking should always be positive. This means that, for each candidate response, marks are accumulated for the demonstration of relevant skills, knowledge and understanding: they are not deducted from a maximum on the basis of errors or omissions.

## Instructions for candidates

This assessment applies to the assignment for National 5 Fashion and Textile Technology.

The assignment is worth 45 marks. The marks contribute 35% of the overall marks for the course assessment.

It assesses the following skills, knowledge and understanding:

- research skills
- evaluation skills

The assignment has two stages:

Stage 1 - design and plan - 35 marks Stage 2 - testing and evaluation - 10 marks

In this assessment, you have to:

• carry out a fashion/textile item development task in response to a brief

You will plan a fashion/textile item, then test and evaluate the suitability of the item for the brief. The assignment is a written exercise only, no physical item or solution has to be made.

You must use the National 5 Fashion and Textile Technology Assignment Candidate workbook to present your assignment.

Your teacher or lecturer will provide you with the range of briefs which are set by SQA. You must use one of these briefs as the basis for your assignment.

Your teacher or lecturer will give you details of how the assessment will be carried out and any required conditions for doing it.

Once you have chosen your brief, you should carry out the following:

### Stage 1 — design and plan

(35 marks)

The marks in this stage are awarded for:

- 1a Identifying **two** key themes to investigate from your chosen brief.
- 1b Producing evidence of carrying out **three** investigations into the key themes, using at least **two** different investigative techniques.
- 1c Presenting an appropriate solution for the detailed fashion/textile item, based on the investigations, with **seven** features which refer to findings from the investigations.

Your evidence provided for this stage should include:

- evidence from your investigations, in an appropriate format
- your solution for the fashion textile item in response to the brief, for example annotated diagrams/illustrations/fabric samples

#### Stage 2 – testing and evaluation

(10 marks)

The marks in this stage are awarded for:

- 2a Carrying out a test into the suitability of the item.
- 2b Gathering information on the suitability of the design.
- 2c Evaluating the solution with reference to the brief and/or solution, based on findings from the test.

Your evidence provided for this stage is:

• evidence of your testing and your completed evaluation
